

What's the point of education in the age of AI?

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Abstract: Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Large Language Models (LLMs) are revolutionising how we live, work and model. Importantly, these tools are also upending how we teach and learn. But it's not the first time that a new technology has caused this kind of disruption or transformative change (depending on how you view it!). Writing, the printing press, calculators, personal computers and Google have each in their turn challenged educators to reflect on the deeper question of "What is education for?" in order to move forward.
